The 26th Annual Heartland Japanese Language Contest

Friday, March 8th (on-line quizzes) and Saturday, March 9th, 2024, at JCCC Regnier Center Capital Federal Room 11190 Quivira Rd, Overland Park, KS 66210

The theme for the 2024 Japanese Language Contest is 勇気(ゆうき-courage).

This annual contest is hosted by the Heart of America Japan-America Society (HAJAS) and the Japanese Language Contest Planning Committee (JLCPC). Among the sponsors are Johnson County Community College, the Japanese Consulate at Chicago, Kansas University Center for East Asian Studies, Olathe District Schools Japanese Language Program, and the JET Alumni Association.

This event provides local Japanese students with the opportunity to showcase their Japanese language skills and to meet virtually and in person with others. The competitions and performances are listed below (with additional details on the following pages).

Select ONE (1) from the following choices.

漢字: (a) 勇気 (ゆうき-courage), (b) 辰 (たつ-dragon), or ひらがな: (c) たつどし (year of the dragon)

- Students with any level of proficiency may enter. Each contestant may enter one calligraphy sample.
- All entries must be written on the correct side of a 13" x 9-½" Japanese calligraphy paper (Hanshi), using a Japanese calligraphy brush and Bokuju or India ink.
- The first name of the calligrapher should be written in the lower left corner of the Hanshi and should appear significantly smaller than the other characters..

Judging criteria: Judges will check for proper strokes and brush movement, including proper stops and hooks. Judges will also look for appropriate thickness of the strokes and overall balance of the character on the page. As a reference, see a sample from 2023 below:

Participants are encouraged to incorporate this year's theme, 勇気,(courage), in their tanka and manga.

Event 2a: Tanka in English (High school and 1st year college students only) and

Event 2b: 日本語の 短歌 (All levels are welcome)

- Only one entry is allowed per language.
- **English Version:** Create a PPT Slide that has your tanka written horizontally in English with your name, and a corresponding image. All images used must be original or free use images without copyright or watermarks.

• Japanese Version: Create a PPT Slide that has your 短歌 written vertically in Japanese with your name, an English translation, and a corresponding image. Remember to start your tanka vertically on the right with the first line, and progress line by line to the left (see examples and judging criteria below). All images used must be original or free use images-without copyright or watermarks.

Judging criteria for the Tanka Contest:

English tanka: Correct Format (5-7-5-7-7 Syllables); appropriate image for all ages; and the ability of the tanka to evoke the intended emotion or reverence reflecting the theme.

Japanese tanka: Correct format (5-7-5-7-7 Syllables in Japanese); an accurate English translation is not required to follow the 5-7-5-7-7 syllable format; appropriate image for all ages; and the ability of the tanka to evoke the intended emotion or reverence reflecting the theme.

Font Size: Use a minimum font size of 18 pt on your slides

Balance: Consider the overall balance of the composition, the size of the poem to the image, the interpretation of the image with the poem, and the overall positioning of the written and graphic elements. Templates are provided on the padlet links (see below).



Event 3: 四コマまんが - Four Panel Manga in Japanese - Digital submission and registration due by



- All students are welcome to enter.
- Only one entry is allowed per student.
- Four-panel manga (yonkoma manga) is a traditional form of entertainment in Japan. Each comic is made up of four panels (read left to right, then top to bottom) each playing a distinct part in telling a story.
 - O The first panel is used to set the scene, providing the setting, situation, and characters.
 - The second panel builds upon the first panel.
 - O The third panel is a set up for the pun often using a slight twist. It is like the punchline in western stories, the pun serves as the falling action.
 - The fourth panel brings the story to its conclusion usually in a comical manner.

Judging criteria:



Originality-While inspiration can come from internet sources, the work should reflect the student's original ideas.

Images- Original artwork is favored by the judges. If borrowed images are used, they must be free- use.

Creativity-Judges will look for creative use of the Japanese language.

Overall Content-The content reflects the 勇気 theme and is appropriate for all ages.

Categories:

- Category 1 is for High school and College 1st year students. Up to 2 pages of Genko-yoshi (800 characters, including punctuation)
- Category 2 is for College 2nd year students. Up to 4 pages of Genko-yoshi (1600 characters, including punctuation)
- Category 3 is for College 3rd year students and up. Up to 4 pages of Genko-yoshi (1600 characters, including punctuation)

Note: You may use kanji in your Japanese script.

Theme: Any topic

Eligibility: This contest is open to all students who are enrolled in high school or college. Contestants must meet the following requirements.

- 1. Non-native speaker of Japanese and learning Japanese as a foreign language.
- 2. Have not lived/studied in Japan for more than two years after the age of 6.
- 3. Were not raised in homes where Japanese is spoken regularly.

Additional requirements and guidelines:

- 1. Your speech must be your original work. You may get help with grammar and pronunciation from your instructors and tutors; however, you must not use any kind of translation programs/software or Al. The sophistication of your Japanese should be appropriate for your current level of your study including use of kanji.
- 2. Your face must be visible for the duration of the presentation. No slides or images are allowed in the video. It should be just you!
- 3. Well-rehearsed and memorized speeches will receive higher scores; however, briefly referencing notes is permissible.
- 4. Winners will be invited to the in-person contest on March 9th to receive a certificate and a ribbon. The 1st prize winner in each category will be invited to give their speech live on stage.
- 5. Your speech will be judged on the following 5 points:
 - a. Content (engagement with the topic), b. Overall Impression, c. Language Use, d. Delivery & Fluency, and e. Pronunciation & Intonation.

- A. かな かるた Beginning level learners 1st year HS; 1st Semester college
- B. JLPT N5 かんじ かるた High Beginner level 2nd year HS; 2nd or 3rd Semester college
- C. JLPT N4 漢字 かるた Low Intermediate 3rd and 4th year HS; 4th Semester college
- D. JLPT N3 漢字 かるた Intermediate 3rd and 4th year college


We follow JCCC and local mandates for in-person gatherings. If the in-person event is canceled, you will be notified by email.

All digital and on-line events will be held as planned.

- Karuta tests your speed and your memory. A word is read out and the players grab the correct, corresponding card. The winner is the player with the most cards at the end of the match.
- These are single elimination tournaments. Players will be randomly paired for the first round of matches. Each match will have a single winner who will advance to the next round. There will be no draws.
- In the preliminary rounds, the loser of each match is eliminated.
- The winners of each match advance to the next round where they will be randomly paired again with players still active in the tournament.
- This will continue until only two players remain for the title match.

No-Shows: If your opponent fails to show up for a round, they automatically forfeit the round and do not advance.

Uneven number of entrants: If there is an uneven number of entrants, the player will get a pass on the first round as if their opponent was a no-show. See example:



- 1) Karuta is played by two people who sit or stand (if using tables) facing each other. When prompted by the reader (yomi-te) players bow and say "Yoroshiku onegaishimasu". Karuta begins with a bow, and finishes with a bow, like a Judo match. Politeness is very important.
- 2) An uneven number of cards (tori-fuda) are divided and placed face-down in front of each player.
- 3) The players turn their cards face up and arrange them in 1 to 3 rows, in whatever order makes sense to them.
- 4) Once the cards are arranged, the reader allows the players exactly two minutes to memorize the locations of their own cards and the cards of their opponent.
- 5) When the two minutes are up, the yomi-te begins the game. The players say "Yoroshiku onegai shimasu," bow to each other and to the yomi-te.



JLC Tournament Play:

1) The rounds alternate between hiragana and katakana karuta. The title match is a combination of hiragana and katakana words. The yomi-te will read the hiragana or katakana word. The players listen for the first character read and

attempt to be first one to grab the correct picture card. The only exception would be in the case of " δ ". If δ is used, the yomi-te will emphasize the δ in the word.

2) The cards will have the character in the corner, and a picture that represents the word associated with it.

The yomi-te will repeat the word until the correct card is chosen.

3) Immediately after identifying the character, the players compete to take the matching Tori-fuda as fast as they can.



Skilled players do not need to look before grabbing the card as they have already memorized the position during the memorization time.

- 4) A player may not touch more than one card when searching. The yomi-te will indicate whether the selected card is correct or not. A player that selects an incorrect card may not select another card until the next word is read.
- 5) The player who takes the correct card and shows it to the Yomi-te first keeps it as a point. The Yomi-te will be the referee in awarding points.



- 6) In the case of a tie, players will play jan-ken for the point. It will be a single jan-ken for the point, not the best 2 out of 3. Reference: https://www.tofugu.com/japan/janken/7) Players may place any scattered cards back in their original place and straighten up any
- cards moved askew. After the point is awarded, play continues until all cards are cleared from the floor.
- 8) The player with the most points wins the round and advances to the next round in the bracket. The title round includes a mix of hiragana and katakana words.
